This CD includes both of these indexes previously published on microfiche as two sets. The *Immigration Deposit Journals [NSW] Index 1853-1900* contains 67,199 entries listed separately for both immigrants and depositors and includes a comprehensive alphabetical variant name index. Many convicts and early immigrants established in the Colony sponsored relatives and employees and, in a large majority of entries, details such as location, parish, townland or address in the county of origin, ship etc are specified. The filmed journals are included in the State Records NSW Archives Resources Kit and our index provides ready access to the information they contain. This index lists the name and age of the proposed immigrant, sponsor (depositor), date of deposit, deposit number, State Records NSW microfilm reel number and, in a remarks column, codes for information where available in the original journal entry and noted if the deposit is for any other family members. These codes are fully explained in the introduction. The *Immigration Deposit Regulations Supplementary Index 1856-1857* is an index of 4,297 records compiled from Embarkation Orders and Shipping Lists of arrivals between November 1856 to February 1858 with the actual lists covering the period when only the Depositors' Journal survived in the Immigration Deposit Journals series. Again, we have compiled separate lists for the immigrants and depositors. Like the IDJs, these records provide that vital link between family and extended family, often cousins, uncles etc. with different surnames. Each immigrant's age is given and families are grouped. Five of the ships went direct to Moreton Bay. *[Requires Adobe Reader 6 or higher]*



FREE RAILWAY PASSES (NSW) INDEX 1880-1892 (ISBN 0 947284 49 4)

This index of 23,899 entries has been compiled from surviving registers of applications for free Railway Passes. The volumes were transferred from the Chief Secretary's Department to the Mitchell Library in June 1934 and they are now at State Records NSW (*Immigration Agent; NRS 5283, Registers of free railway passes, 1880-92 [4/4678-85]*). These passes were generally issued to those immigrants to the Colony (the 'Colony' being NSW) seeking employment in country or outer metropolitan areas; although many were issued to men, women and children for charitable reasons. The date range of the registers is not indicative of how long the applicants were in the Colony with some having arrived within days or weeks of the application while others were in the Colony for years, from a few to up to 50+ years. Most entries note the applicant's native place, age, married or single and how long in the Colony and, with the majority of records, include a great amount of other detail. *[Requires Adobe Reader 6 or higher]*

This index of 22,574 records has been compiled primarily from lists published in the NSW Government Gazette in 1832-1833 of assignments (male and female), absconders, absconders (runaways) apprehended and a small list of those whose Ticket of Leave were cancelled. We have included convict records from State Records NSW of assignments to assist in harvesting and surveying. All of these records have been cross-indexed by employer, native place (where noted), date of the record, type of record ie assignments, absconders etc, location, reference, ship and a remarks column contains the cross-reference mentioned above and any other relevant detail. *[Requires Adobe Reader 6 or higher]*

Miss Mathilde E Deane, working at the PRO London in 1929-30, compiled an index (sometimes referred to as The Settlers' Letters Index) to miscellaneous letters by or about settlers, military and individuals in the Colonial Office series of records including, in the early portion, both New South Wales and Van Diemens Land. The letters have been filmed by the AJCP (Australian Joint Copying Project). Miss Deane's index is arranged chronologically, but with several sections for each year. She indexed by name of letter writer only with a précis of the contents and notation of persons' names mentioned therein. We compiled a composite index of all names noting whether the person listed was the writer or subject of the letter and cross-referencing both letter writer and subject. We have given both the AJCP and Mitchell Library reference and note any other details in the remarks column. Because we included two lists of petitioners from the AJCP records which were only listed by the regiment name in Miss Deane's index, we have noted whether the event was from the Deane Index or the Colonial Office correspondence. There is a large volume of correspondence exchanged between public figures of the day, much concerned with political wrangling and court cases. Regiment Index 1836-1852 is extracted from lists of unclaimed letters published, from 1832, in the NSW Government Gazette. In many cases, as well as the addressee, the published lists included the expected locations of these persons in the Colonies (many of the places were in Victoria, South Australia, Queensland, New Zealand etc). Many of them also noted the ship of arrival of the addressee or their current or late regiment. In some cases, it proved impossible to know whether the reference was to a location or a ship and, in these cases, the name has been included with a question mark after it. These ship/regiment references were noted in the lists published for the period 1836-1852 and we have listed in our index of 2,790 entries the name, the date and page number of the Gazette in which the list was published, the ship or regiment name and any other information such as occupation has been included in a remarks column. The Unemployed Registers 1860, 1884 Index of 494 records was compiled from two volumes at the State Records NSW: Register of Unemployed 1860, 1884. The 1860 volume seems to have been compiled for a Committee comprising the Mayor, the Inspector General of Police and the Agent for Immigration. The volume shows for each unemployed person the date of interview, name, age, calling, marital status, residence, size of family (if any), how long unemployed, and name of ship, date of arrival and where sent. The 1884 volume shows, for each employment applicant, the application date, name, age, calling, address, marital status, ship of arrival and where sent. Our index lists the name, age, occupation, marital status, date of interview (under D.O.Event), address (Loc. Event), the State Records NSW reference, ship of arrival, where given, and any other information given is noted in an abbreviated form in a remarks column. The Wages Paid to Orphans Index 1849-1851 comprises 612 entries of Irish orphan girls, their employers and other relevant persons mentioned in the records. It was compiled from State Records NSW source Wages paid to orphans, 1849-51 with references or additional entries where applicable to Particulars of orphans monies, 1850-51. The Wages paid to orphans register shows the name of the orphan, ship of arrival, amount due to the orphan from master or employer, amount paid by master or employer into orphan's account and amount withdrawn from account and paid to orphans. The records only exist for those orphan girls who had money banked on their behalf. The Particulars of orphans monies are papers relating to the amounts banked. We have listed the orphans and their employers etc, noting their status, event date, the event itself, the location of the event if it was noted, the source reference, the ship name when given and we have included any additional information in an abbreviated form in a remarks column with cross-references to the employer/orphan. UNASSISTED ARRIVALS TO SYDNEY (NSW) INDEX 1842-1857 (ISBN 978-0-9577658-3-2) \$110.00

This fully field-searchable index now includes the year 1857 and contains over 191,800 entries including 25,000 additional passengers and variant names from two Sydney newspapers. The Unassisted Arrivals to Sydney (NSW) Index 1842-1857 was compiled from three State Records NSW sources - Reports of Vessels Arrived 1842-56; Passengers Arriving Sydney 1846 and Shipping Master's Office (Passengers Arriving) 1854-57 - supplemented by additional names from the Sydney Morning Herald Shipping Intelligence columns. The list was then compared with the arrivals in the Shipping Gazette and Sydney General Trade List, a weekly publication reproducing shipping information as, on occasion, an arrival was omitted from one or other of the sources. All name variations were noted and, if sufficiently different, appear as separate entries with cross-referencing in our remarks column. We have included the name of any regiment noted plus any deaths on board. Our index lists the name, age (when given), arrival date, status (master, passenger or crew - crew only listed from 1854), departure ports including foreign, coastal and interstate and a remarks column noting any additional information such as place of origin, nationality etc. The index is fully searchable by * Name * Ship Name *Arrival Year, Date, Month *Departure Port *Reference *Remarks OR a combination of any of these; and also by Entry Number. Includes many ship arrivals that are not generally included in the State Records NSW records from Moreton Bay and NSW coastal ports such as Clarence River, Port Macquarie, Twofold Bay, Newcastle etc, as they are reported in the Sydney Morning Herald and these have been included in this list. Search results can be * Sorted and *Printed or *Exported in several formats such as MS Excel spreadsheet, MS Word, HTML, PDF, TIFF, XFF and Open Office Writer. Accessible via the Help button are PDF files of * Source Illustrations including one of the pages missed in the filming of the records and also extracted lists showing * Ships from German Ports * Shipping Master's Office - Missing Ship Lists 1854-57. Lists 2,052 entries compiled from State Records NSW source: Immigration; NRS 5327, Passengers Arriving at Port Phillip 1846 [X632]; microfilm reel 1408. Details from this unique source have been transcribed and included in this index and are name [SURNAME FirstName] and ages where given, ship, status [master, crew, passenger or other], date of arrival, departure ports and, in a remarks column, the type of ship, arrival port if other than Port Phillip, native county and country of passenger, occupation, whether intending to become a settler in the Colony, or a visitor only, and any other comments noted in the original records. The indexed records are listed in the original arrival order and also in alphabetical lists in the order of passengers, ships with passengers, ships only and departure ports with passengers. The departure ports include foreign, coastal and interstate although none are from NSW or Qld. [Requires Adobe Reader 6 or higher]
